## A New Perspective on Administrative Courts: Data-Driven Study Reveals Courts' Real Intervention Rates

This article examines the rate of intervention of Israeli administrative courts in state authority decisions. The research makes use of a large dataset of cases compiled and classified by the Israeli Court System, from which the average rate of intervention can be measured. Detailed human annotation was then performed on a sample of the dataset, in order to obtain a more accurate estimate of intervention. Both estimates are lower than the accepted international average rate of 30% which was recorded by several researchers. The article demonstrates how access to legal datasets can improve our understanding of the legal process. In particular, the research finds a wide gap between the apparent level of intervention that results in the official classification and the "real" level of intervention. Additionally, it demonstrates how courts impact the way the executive branch operates even without formal intervention.
